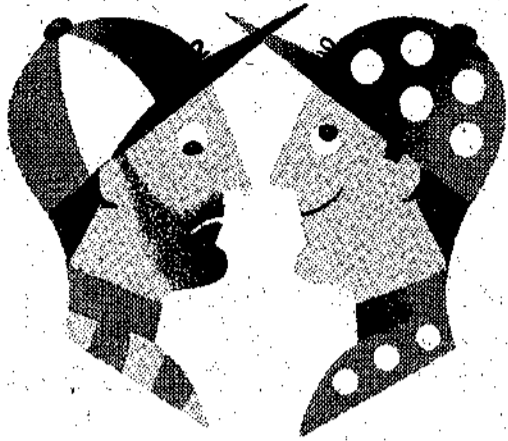


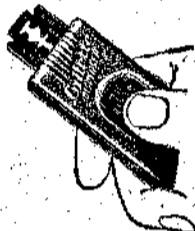

LOFTHOUSE THE HERO OF
A GREAT WIN IN VIENNA

Vienna, Sunday.

ENGLAND scored a great victory here today when they beat
Austria, the Continent's first footballing side, 3-2—and
confirmed my confidence in this keen, eager-to-win England
team.

At the end, British soldiers mobbed our boys, and chaired them off
the field into the dressing room. Amongst those English players was
Nat Lofthouse, weary, and limping from an injured leg, but still the
hero of the match for these soldier boys. The man who had scored the
goal that gave us victory.

Nat collected a long throw by goalkeeper Gil Merrick on the half-
way line, ran on, beat his man, and as the advancing Austrian goal-
keeper, Musil, came to meet him lobbed the ball into the net.

Then Nat crashed into Musil and
collapsed. He was carried off the field, had
his leg strapped up by trainer Jimmy
Trotter, and limped back to take his place
in the middle and later swap places on
the left wing with Billy Elliott.

That wasn't the end of Nat. He
gathered another ball, limped his way
past an Austrian defender, and blazed in
a long twenty yard shot, that crashed
against an upright.

It was enough to make us forget those
two early misses by Nat.

Lofthouse had scored in the twenty-
eighth minute—a hard drive from a Billy
Elliott cross. But a minute later the
Austrians were on even terms with a
penalty goal by Huber. Dienst was judged
by the Italian referee, Garpani, to have
been fouled by Jack Froggatt.

But within two minutes England had
taken the lead again.

Jackie Sewell, playing his first over-
seas full international for England,
wove his way through the Austrian
defence and put a low, right-footed
drive into the right-hand corner.

Back came Austria. Melchior was un-
marked, but Billy Wright charged in and
blocked his shot. The danger was past.
But for one minute only. Centre forward
Dienst worked his way carefully from the
half-way line, bamboozling the English
defence and flashed in a terrific drive that
Merrick never saw.

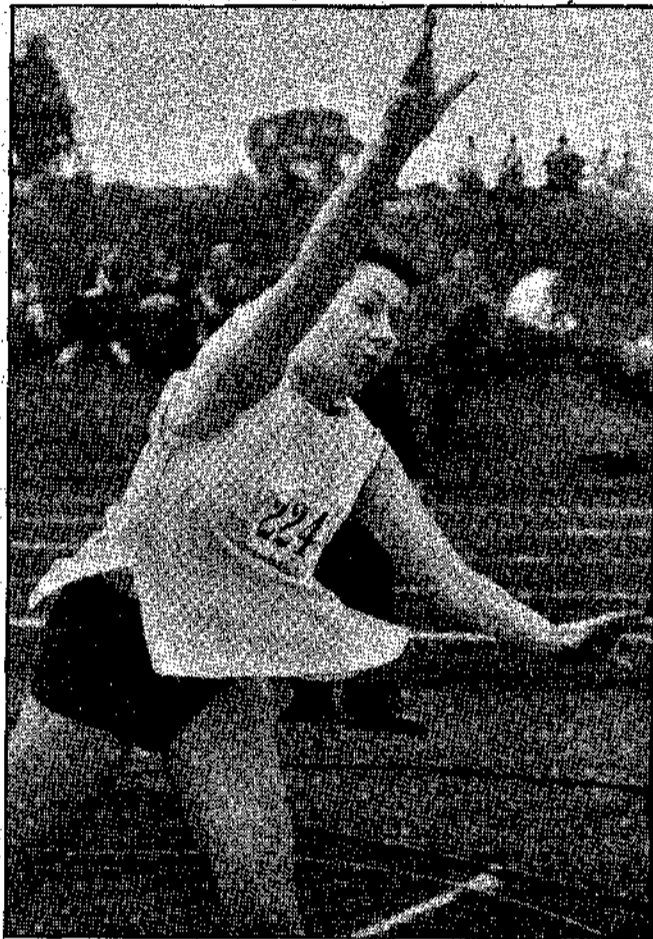
The second half lost some of the earlier
period's sting. Baily and Finney went up
the left wing, but Finney lost the ball to
Roedel.

Finney again. This time as he went
through he was tripped by general-pur-
poses defence-cum-attack man, Ocwirk.

The Austrians dropped their go-for-
goal technique in an attempt to walk the
ball in. But it failed time and again
on the defence of Froggatt, Eckersley
and Ransley.

In the twenty-second minute Merrick
dived to save from Melchior and only a
brilliant diving save from full back Roedel
saved the Austrians when Lofthouse
looked like going through.

Three minutes later Nat made one of
his "fluff" shots, hooking over the bar
after a nice cross from Elliott.



Tulyar, our
No. 1, may
not run in
the Derby

ALL admirers of Tul-
yar, the best-backed
English colt in the
Derby, are advised to re-
frain from backing him
in the ante-post mar-
ket. I understand that
he is more than likely to
miss the big race on
Wednesday because of
the hard ground, and
this belief was sup-
ported by a London
bookmaker who on Sat-
urday was offering the
colt at 20-1, nearly six
points longer than his
call-over price.

No definite decision
has yet been made, but
the warning is there. If
there is not a consider-
able amount of rain be-
fore Wednesday, Tulyar
will be in the field only
because the chance of
winning a Derby, what-
ever the conditions, has
been too strong to resist.

With the big race only
a couple of days away
the tips for outsiders
are increasing, and the
latest to reach me is for
Bold Buccaneer.

In such a year he
could be another sur-
prise winner, such as
Airborne. It may seem
a fantastic tip, but he
possesses exactly the
same record as did Air-
borne before his 1946
Derby win.

Both colts ran four
times as two-year-olds
without winning. As
three-year-olds they
failed in their first race,
and then gained a win
in their next and only
other race prior to the
Derby.

What is more, both
victories were in a mile
and a half maiden race
at Newmarket in May.

Let me also pass on a
tip for H.V.C. He is
fancied more than a
little down Epsom way,
and I can guarantee
that the horse and his
big race jockey Mauch
Taylor, are both fighting
fit and eager for the off.

Another warning.
Postman's Path will dis-
like the hard ground
more than most of Wed-
nesday's runners, and
he may show that the
St. Leger is a road he
prefers to tread.
